A Look at Modern Quilts: Nicole Hannah

Nicole presented her program 'A Look at Modern Quilts'. Nicole is the president of the Victoria Modern Quilt Guild. She told us the history of Modern Quilting and how the Movement was founded in 2009 and is now all over the world. We then enjoyed a presentation of the many lovely quilts she had brought with her and after the presentation had the opportunity to look at the books she had brought along.

Nicole also provided a handout:

What makes a quilt a modern quilt?

-primarily functional rather than decorative quilts -inspired by modern design, art and architecture -use of bold colours and prints -high contrast and graphic areas of solid colour -improvisational piecing -minimalism -expansive negative space -alternate grid work (lack of visible block structure) -"Modern Traditionalism"

A few other things often used in Modern Quilting: -asymmetry -often use grey and white as neutrals -dense elaborate free motion quilting -pieced, improv backs -lack of borders -oversized blocks -it's a modern quilt because it can't be anything else.

This was a very interesting and educational program.

Did You Know?

(SUR) Prizes, Ribbons and Awards

n six months time our Quilt Show will happen and many of our members are either planning to make or are trying to finish a quilt in time to enter into the show. Our show is a chance for you to display your quilts in a public place. Our shows are non-juried and we do not use judges. All members are encouraged to enter at least one item in the show, and who knows, you might even win a ribbon or two.

So how do you win a ribbon if there are no judges? Simply put, we let the public vote on their favourite entry. Originally when we started hosting quilt shows back in the 1980's they were for display only. The displays comprised of antique quilts and quilts made by Guild members. By the third annual Heritage Quilt show in 1987, the attendees to the show were asking for the opportunity to choose their favourite quilt. At the following show, a ballot box was introduced and the three quilts that received the most votes were awarded a "Viewers' Choice Award."

Over the next few shows, which were held every year in June, a Viewers' Choice was always awarded to the quilt with the most votes. Sometimes more than one quilt would receive the award. In 1990 five quilts placed within one vote of each other and each received a small prize. In 1995 and in 1996 a Rosette from the Canadian Quilters' Association was presented to the quilt with the most votes. In 1997, at the Oh! My Stars Quilt Show, the public had an opportunity to vote on two categories, one for Large Quilts, and the other was for Small Quilts. Rosettes were made from the Show's colour, theme and were awarded to both winners.

In 2001, the Quilt Show moved to Beban Park and the Quilt Show Committee felt it was time to increase the amount of awards and ribbons that could be won. There would be 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners for Viewers' Choice in Large Quilts and Small Quilts. The Past Presidents' Choice Award was introduced with the Guild's Past Presidents voting on their favourite. This show also introduced the Secret Ballot Award consisting of six Mystery Categories such as: Best Use of

the Colour Purple, or Most Nostalgic Quilt. The Canadian Quilters' Association again provided a Rosette for the quilt with the most votes.

For our upcoming show the Ballot Committee has informed us that there will be several categories that members could receive ribbons. Each category will have 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners. There will also be the Past Presidents' Award, and Secret Ballot category comprising six secret ballots. New for this year is the "First Show Entry" category which is open to anyone who has never entered a quilt into one of our shows.

Our title (SUR) Prizes, Ribbons and Prizes for this article refers to our last Quilt Show when a new member entered her very first quilt and received a first place ribbon. She was very surprised and excited for her special recognition and winning ribbon.

We hope very member will seriously think about entering a quilt.

With the celebration of Canada's 150th anniversary going on that year I'm sure there will be many exciting plans in the works.

Fabric 4L – (cut 1) 2 1/2" x 8 1/2" rectangle


Fabric 5D - (cut 1) 2 1/2" x 8 1/2" rectangle

2016 Nanaimo Quilt Guild Challenge

eing a busy quilt show year, the challenge is going to be small, fun, and simple ... something for everyone to take part in, and use your stash!

Create a placemat, 12" x 18" finished, in any quilt style you enjoy: pieced, appliquéd, paper pieced for example, and bounce out of your box by adding a delightful border! Use a pattern, or create an original. It must be sandwiched with backing and batting, and quilted. Edges can be finished as you wish -

bound, enveloped, whatever. Limit embellishments, as dishes won't sit well on dimensional placemats.

One entry per guild member, please. Entries are to be submitted at the April guild meetings and will be voted on at the May meeting with prizes awarded at that time. Quilt Guild Members will vote on their favourite, and prizes (generously donated by Cindy's Threadworks) will be awarded for first, second, and third, simply based on the most votes! All entries will be displayed at the Quilt Show in June and will then become a charitable donation to the Placemat Committee!
